What we do?


- iCeGS is an international research centre with expertise in employability and career development.

- We are supported by an Associate network of over 100 practitioners and consultants








About research

What is research? How can it help?

Research is a careful and detailed study into a specific problem, concern, or issue using scientific methods.

- It increases knowledge
- Tests ideas
- Establishes new theories



Applied research: Research to solve problems







Evaluation?

When people seek to evaluate what they are doing as part of an attempt to learn and improve, they are usually undertaking a **formative evaluation**, so called because it is undertaken to inform what is done while the activity is still in progress.

'We would like to find out how to do these things better'

When people evaluate to make a judgement on the value of a particular activity and to draw out what has been learnt, it is usually a **summative evaluation**; so called because it attempts to create a summary of what has been achieved and what the impacts have been.

'We would like to find out how well these things work' Dent et al (2014)





Types of evaluation

Input evaluation measures what goes into the provision for example policies, entitlement statements, programmes of careers education, staffing, curriculum time

Output evaluation has the emphasis on the outcomes and results of the learning for example students are better career planners







Why evaluate?

Evaluation enables us to:

- examine what we do
- think about how we can improve it
- decide on whether it was worth doing
- provide others with a summary to help them to understand what was done.






What are the limitations of research

- It doesn't always give us the answers we want to hear!
- Sometimes it just leads to more questions
- Sometimes we ask the wrong questions
- Sometimes we use the wrong methods


